

A Reflection for Memorial Day

"Greater love has no one than this, that a person will lay down his life for his friends."

John 15:13

"Ask not what your country can do for you; ask what you can do for your country."

John F. Kennedy's Inauguration Speech, 1961

Many of us have had our lives shaped by the words we hear or read. Sometimes these quotes resonate within our soul and begin to offer meaning to us as we continue to grow. When I was a child in Sunday School I was deeply impressed by the quote from John: "that a person lay down his life for his friends." I began grade school while the Korean War was still going on, and my young mind understood the honorable act of a soldier giving his life for his friends. Then as I was completing junior high school John F. Kennedy inspired us to "ask what you can do for your country." My oldest brother considered the Peace Corps; I began planning a career in the US Army.

As we celebrate Memorial Day, I urge you to consider its origins: After our Civil War, soldiers gathered in late spring on the battlefields to remember and honor their fallen comrades and foes. These Veterans brought spring flowers to decorate the graves. They prayed for their friends: for the living, the wounded, and for those who had died.

On Memorial Day when I was a child, families would visit their family gravesite. They would bring flowers to decorate the graves; they would clean and weed the site and would bring a picnic lunch as they shared their memories of their family.

This Memorial Day I ask that you remember our traditions. I ask that you visit those gravesites and honor our dead. I also ask that you thank a Veteran. Please remember our history and those who gave so much for our freedoms.
